The department of English at Florida Atlantic University recently received a gift of \$150,000 from the Lawrence A. Sanders Foundation to be used for the Lawrence A. Sanders Memorial Fellowship in Creative Writing.

With this donation, an annual fellowship in creative writing will be awarded to a graduate student in the Dorothy F. Schmidt College of Arts and

"This gift will allow us to attract some of the country's most promising writing students to our MFA program," said Andrew Furman, chair of FAU's department of English. "This talent helps the MFA program and our department gain national prominence."

This is the third gift the department of English's Creative Writing Program has received from the Sanders Foundation since 2001 to advance the work and memory of Lawrence A. Sanders.

The first gift established the

Lawrence A. Sanders Memorial Fellowship in English and the second created the Lawrence A. Sanders Writer-in-Residence.

To date, the Sanders Foundation has donated \$400,000 to FAU. After additional matching contributions from the state of Florida, this contribution has resulted in an endowment of \$600,000 that supports creative writing at FAU.

Sanders, a best-selling South Florida novelist who died in 1998, achieved success with his novels "The Anderson Tapes" and "The First Deadly Sin." The latter was the first in a series of thrillers that gained him praise as a contemporary mystery writer.

"We are delighted to be able to help support talented young writers as they pursue their academic studies," said Daniel Brede, trustee for the Lawrence A. Sanders Foundation. "We are lucky to have such a distinctive creative writing program right here at FAU."

FAU receives 38 applications for top fundraiser job

Florida Atlantic University has received applications from 38 people looking to fill the vacant position of university advancement director.

That's the person responsible for heading FAU's major fundraising efforts. It has been open since the April 2 departure of Lawrence Davenport, who resigned - and took with him a nearly \$578,000 severance package that caused considerable consternation on campus.

Wrath has mainly been directed at FAU President Frank T. Brogan, who issued a statement saying that he wanted Davenport to

leave, but did not want to fire him because he did not want to jeopardize his ability to find another job. Brogan said he renegotiated his contract allowing him to resign with two years of severance pay. His previous pact gave him no severance unless he were fired.

Brogan said the money for Davenport's severance will come from vending machine revenue.

FAU Finance Chief Ken Jessell is filling the job on an interim basis. In the meantime, a review committee headed by Dr. Anne Boykin, the director of the Christine E. Lynn School of Nursing, is about to begin reviewing the applications.

University spokeswoman Kris-

tine McGrath confirmed this week that 38 people filed applications for the job when the deadline came. The university did not do a nationwide search, but, rather, advertised the job on the FAU web site and in a trade journal.

Davenport was the third person to fill the fundraiser job in the past five years.

Troubles in that office seemed to begin in 2002 when former fundraising chief Carla Coleman was suspended and then left after she arranged the purchase of a red Corvette for former FAU President Anthony Catanese when he left to become president of the Florida Institute of Technology. She did it against the wishes of the FAU



Soon after, FAU hired Ann Paton, who gave up a similar position at Brown University in Providence to take the FAU job. She left in 2005 to become head of fundraising at Barry University.

At that time, Davenport, who was already on staff, was shifted to Paton's spot.

FAU picks contractor to build 'green' engineering building

Florida Atlantic University has chosen James A. Cummings Inc., a contractor with offices in Fort Lauderdale. West Palm Beach and Orlando, as construction manager for the new College of Engineering Building on the Boca Raton

"What makes this complex unique is that it will be submitted to the United States Green Building Council for certification as a LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certified 'Platinum' level," said Nicole Flier, director of business development in Palm Beach County for the firm. Platinum is the highest of four levels of environmental friendliness.

"Upon successful completion, this project will be one of the first to obtain the prestigious distinction of 'Platinum' level in the State of Florida," she said.

The new engineering building is one of several projects in Boca Raton being considered for the "green" environmentally friendly designation. The Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing at FAU is also in the process of being certified, and several other structures are also in line for green certification.

A lot of hype

The engineering building "is our first platinum building," said Flier. She said the firm is planning "a lot of hype," and will also work with the university to conduct a fundraiser for it.

Flier explained that while plans call for the College of Engineering complex to have 250,000 square feet of new construction, the initial phase will contain between 80,000 and 100,000 square feet.

"This will include classroom and laboratory spaces as well as administrative areas along with a super computing center and the 'Center for Innovation Leadership," she said.

"What also makes this building unique is that it will be a 'living, learning' laboratory," Flier added. "Students will be able to learn about green building concepts from the use of educational plaques, which will be located throughout the complex."

Some of these features may include the use of enhanced indoor environmental controls, high efficiency exterior wall systems, solar panels, high efficiency plumbing and wastewater systems, xeri-

system to reduce water usage and other techniques will be considered into the design.

She said the estimated start date is early 2008 with an anticipated completion date of fall 2009.

James A. Cummings Inc. has
