School Spirit Soars as Owl Prowl 2004 Takes Center Stage

Nov. 8-14 Homecoming to feature community service events, bonfire, gridiron activities

School spirit is shifting to high gear as the University gets ready to celebrate Homecoming Nov. 8-14. Known as "Owl Prowl," the annual tradition takes on special significance this year, as FAU is in the midst of its year-long 40th anniversary celebration.

In the FAU homecoming tradition, the focus of Owl Prowl is not just celebrating football, but also helping the South Florida community with service projects such as the Angel Giving Tree, the Heart Walk, Owl Care and more.

"I can't think of a more exciting Homecoming than this one," said President Brogan. "We are marking our 40th anniversary and are the proud supporters of an exciting football team. With events on all campuses, I hope that everyone will participate in as many as possible."

Centerpiece of Owl Prowl 2004 will be the homecoming football game that pits FAU against Sun Belt Conference rival New Mexico State. The game will be held Saturday, Nov. 13, at Lockhart Stadium. Tailgating, a pep rally and special alumni activities will begin at 1 p.m., with kickoff at 4 p.m. The Fighting Owls enter the game with an impressive 6-2 record; the Aggies are 4-5. Two Plays About Texas Featured

The Department of Theatre pays tribute to the Lone Star state with two short comic gems set in Texas—Preston Jones' "The Last Meeting of the Knights of the White Magnolia" and Paul Zindel's "Ladies at the Alamo." The plays run Friday, Nov. 12, through Sunday, Nov. 21, and take place in the Studio One Theatre. Shows run Nov. 12, 13, 18, 19 and 20 at 8 p.m. and Nov. 14 and 21 at 2 p.m. FAU faculty, staff and alumni may purchase a ticket for \$10 with ID.

"These two shows capture the old-fashioned stereotypes of Texas," says Jean-Louis Baldet, the director of both plays. "While these characters think they are advanced culturally and civically, they can't shed their Texasness, and that's where the fun begins."

"The Last Meeting of the Knights of the White Magnolia" is about a group of Texas "good old boys" whose view of themselves as civic leaders contrast considerably with the reality of their run-down meeting room in an old hotel.

"Ladies at the Alamo" is set in the reception room of the new multi-million dollar Alamo Theatre, where Dede Cooper, founder and artistic director of the theatre, sees herself as a pillar of social life and sophistication in Texas City, and the Alamo Theatre as the center of culture in the community. When she finds out that there is a plot to replace her with a fading Hollywood star, the audience sees just how sophisticated Dede can be – in "cat fighting" that is.

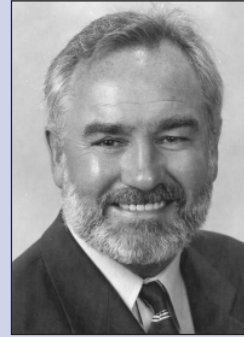
Dr. Alan L. Berger, Raddock Eminent Scholar of Holocaust Studies, has had his new book, *Jewish American and Holocaust Literature: Representation in the Postmodern World*, published by SUNY Press. It was edited by Dr. Berger and Dr. Gloria L. Cronin. Dr. Berger gave a talk on "The Passion of the Christ — Back to the Future?" at the Center for Jewish Studies, University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Dr. Lakhdar Boukerrou, coordinator, Research Programs and Services at the Center for Environmental Studies, presented a paper titled "CES: A Center Dedicated to Applied Environmental Research and Education" at the 37th Congress of the Brazilian Pulp and Paper Technical Association in Sao Paulo, Brazil. While in Brazil, Dr. Boukerrou traveled to the state of Esperito Santo to meet with representatives of the Instituto Ambiental Vale de Rio Doce and the University Federal of Esperito Santo to continue the dialogue started by **Dr. Leonard Berry**, CES director, earlier this year to explore partnership opportunities with these two institutions. Dr. Boukerrou and **Shane Forsythe**, CES information systems administrator, attended the DeltAmerica Project meeting in Buenos Aires. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the progress of the IWRN Web site development and to train members of the inter-American Water Resources Network country nodes. The DeltAmerica Web development project is conducted under the leadership of **Terry Dodge**, CES information systems director. The project's goal is to develop mechanisms for the dissemination of lessons learned in integrated water management across borders in the Americas.

Amy Broderick, visual arts and art history, had two drawings, "Victory Theory" and "Vigilance Association," in the group show, "New Art South Florida," at the Miami Art Museum. She also participated in a public lecture series, "Slide Jam at MAM," at the museum, and discussed her work and participated in a public panel discussion at the Armory Arts Center in West Palm Beach. Two more drawings, "The Red Letter Turns Gray" and "Loving You Was Always..." are included in an exhibition that opened in October at the Jacksonville Museum of Art.

Kelso Named AAAS Fellow

Dr. J.A. Scott Kelso, Glenwood and Martha Creech Eminent Scholar in Science and director of the Center for Complex Systems and Brain Sciences, has been elected to the rank of Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.



This prestigious honor is conferred annually upon individual researchers whose "efforts on behalf of the advancement of science or its applications are scientifically or socially distinguished." Dr. Kelso is being honored for his "innovative use of brain imaging and behavioral techniques to uncover the principles and mechanics underlying the dynamics of coordination of living things." He will be inducted

during the AAAS Fellows Forum at the association's annual meeting in Washington, D.C., on Feb. 19.

Since coming to FAU in 1986, Dr. Kelso has assembled a talented faculty and research staff from around the world, bringing together a multidisciplinary

team of experts in psychology, physics, mathematics, neuroscience and computer science. In 1996, he became the first FAU researcher to receive the prestigious and highly competitive Senior Scientists Award from the National Institute of Mental Health for his contributions toward understanding how the brain controls human behavior, perception, memory and motor skills.

Dr. Charles Carraher, chemistry, has had his book titled *Biomedical Applications* published by Wiley. It details the use of polymers in the treatment of bacterial infections, viruses, cancer and dentistry. It contains a review of some of his work done at FAU with **Dr. Deborah Louda**, chemistry, in the area of creating effective anti-cancer drugs.

The Center for Complex Systems and Brain Sciences' work on rhythm, which ranges from using rhythm to understand basic forms of social coordination to the brain mechanisms underlying the perception and production of rhythm and timing in human beings, was the subject of filming by the Discovery Channel for a future program. The research of **Drs. Kelly Jantzen, Edward Large** and **Center Director Scott Kelso** was highlighted. A ballet titled "M'organitzo" (self-organization) based on Dr. Kelso's work *Dynamic Patterns: The Self-Organization of Brain and Behavior* (4th Printing, MIT Press, 2004) premiered at the Museum of Contemporary Art in Lleida, Portugal, in July. Additional productions are scheduled. Two papers on the

Center's brain research were recently published in *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*. One by **Drs. Jantzen, Fred Steinberg** and **Kelso** was contributed on their behalf by Prof. Ann Graybiel, MIT, a recent recipient of the National Medal of Science. The other by **Dr. A. Brovelli, Mingzhou Ding, Carl Ledberg, Yonghong Chen, R. Nakamura** and **Steven Bressler** was contributed by Dr. Nancy Kopell, a MacArthur Award recipient.

Dr. Robin Fiore, philosophy, has been appointed to the new position of special assistant to the dean for Ethics Initiatives. She has also been appointed Adelaide R. Snyder Professor of Ethics. In these roles, Dr. Fiore will work to raise the Dorothy F. Schmidt College of Arts and Letters' visibility as a center for the study and teaching of ethics. She will develop programs, workshops, courses and other resources that support the integration of ethics into teaching and research.

Dr. Borko Furht, chair, Department of Computer Science Engineering, and **Dr. Ravi Shankar**, director, Center for Systems Integration, are leading the project "One Pass to Production," a Motorola-funded initiative designed to reduce cell phone development time from 24 months to 24 hours. Also participating are **Drs. Michael VanHilst, Imad Mahgoub, Sam Hsu, Hari Kalva** and **Saeed Rajput**, and **Lofton Bullard** and 14 graduate and undergraduate students. The project is in its second year, with Motorola contributing \$250,000 annually. In January 2004, Motorola hired five students who were involved in the project the previous year.



Catanese Center for Urban and Environmental Solution Senior Fellow Frank Schnidman and Japanese Ambassador to the United States Ryozyo Kato met in Atlanta to discuss opportunities for Japanese investment in Florida. Schnidman, who serves as a board member to the Southeast United States/Japan Association, accompanied Enterprise Florida President Darrell Kelly and a Florida delegation to Atlanta for the 28th annual joint meeting of southeast United States business executives and Japanese business executives. Biotech and the Scripps Research Institute were the topics of conversations, as well as the fact that in 2006 Florida will host the meeting, which is expected to draw more than 800 business executives and government officials.

Dr. Mary Ann Gosser Esquilín, Wilkes Honors College, had a chapter titled "Marie (Vieux) Chauvet y Myriam Warner-Vieyra: diarios demenciales o escrituras esculturantes" published in *Género y cultura en América Latina: arte, historia y estudios de género* and an article titled "Rosario Ferré y Olga Nolla: ¿manuscritos reconceptualizando la nación?" in *Confluencia*. Dr. Gosser Esquilín also presented papers at two conferences this summer: "Carpentier and Montero: Caribbean Heirs to Haiti's Revolutionary Legacy" at the University of the West Indies in Trinidad and "Border Crossings in the Caribbean: A Liberatory Poetics for Mayra Montero" at the 9th International Caribbean Women Writers and Scholars Conference in the República Dominicana.

Dr. Sue Graves, exercise science and health promotion, made a presentation titled "Creating a Gerontology Conference for Professionals and Older Adults" at the Sixth World Congress on Aging in London, Ontario, Canada. **Dr. Graves** and former faculty member **Dr. Allison Ford** published "Past and Recent Physical Activity and Bone Mineral Density in College-aged Women" in the latest issue of the *Journal of Strength and Conditioning Research* with co-authors **Dr. Lori Turner** and **Dr. Andy Mauromoustakos**, University of Arkansas. A summary of the article was also highlighted on the home page of the National Strength and Conditioning Association.

Dr. Frederick Greenspahn, Gimelstob Eminent Scholar in Judaic Studies, delivered a paper on "Why Jews Translate the Bible" at the Midwest Jewish Studies Colloquium at Case Western Reserve University.

Dr. Lucy M. Guglielmino, educational leadership, was the featured speaker for the Adult Division at the 48th annual College Reading Association national conference at the Delray Beach Marriott in October. Her topic was "Forging Links: An Introduction to Florida's Online Resources for Facilitators of Adult Learning."

Dr. Michael Harrawood, Wilkes Honors College, received a research fellowship from the Folger Shakespeare Library in Washington, D.C., where he conducted research in early modern technology and economic monopolies in the literature of the English Renaissance.

Dr. Paul Kirchman, Wilkes Honors College, co-authored a paper titled "Suppressor Analysis Points to the Subtle Role of the LAG1 Ceramide Synthase Gene in Determining Yeast Longevity" in *Experimental Gerontology* and presented a poster "Analysis of the Influence of Mitochondrial Point Mutations on Longevity in *Saccharomyces cerevisiae*" at the annual meeting of the American Aging Association.

Robert Konopaske, management, international business and entrepreneurship, had the research article "U.S. Managers' Willingness to Accept a Global Assignment: Do Expatriate Benefits and Assignment Length Make a Difference?" accepted for publication in the *International Journal of Human Resource Management*. His co-author is Steve Werner of the University of Houston.

Dr. David Kumar, science education, co-edited the theme issue *Science Education Policy: A Symposium in the Review of Policy Research*, Volume 20, Number 4. He also is the lead author of the paper "Science, Technology, and Society: A Compelling Context for United States-Canada Collaboration" published in the *American Behavioral Scientist*.

Dr. Isaiah A. Litvak, the Christine & Eugene Lynn Eminent Scholar and chair in international business, was invited by Canada's national newspaper, *The Globe and Mail*, to submit an op-ed article on China's proposed acquisition of Noranda, one of the largest multinational resource-based companies. The article, titled "Beijing and Noranda: Reality Check," was published in October.

Dr. Martha Mendoza, languages and linguistics, presented a paper titled "Politeness Strategies in a Language Isolate: The Case of Tarascan" at the International Conference on Language, Politeness and Gender, held at the University of Helsinki in Finland.

Crystal Mleko, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and Equal Opportunity coordinator, presented a paper titled "Social Services

for Women in the Sex Industry: A National Survey" at the 1st National Conference for Prostitution, Sex Work, and the Commercial Sex Industry: The State of Women's Health, 2004. The conference was sponsored by the Ohio Department of Health and the Social Work Department at the University of Toledo. The paper detailed research evaluating levels of autonomy allotted to sex workers in the delivery of services by various organizations that advertise to or are known for serving this population and was published in the conference proceedings.

Dr. Rakesh Mogul, Wilkes Honors College, completed a nine-week research sabbatical this summer at the Scripps Research Institute in La Jolla, San Diego. His research involved the synthesis of epothilone derivatives for use in antibody conjugation and cancer therapy.

Dr. Jon Moore, Wilkes Honors College, participated as a co-PI on a 17-day NOAA research cruise to the New England Seamounts this past summer. A Remotely Operated Vehicle (ROV) was used to explore the seamount faunas down to 13,000 feet below the surface. Honors College student **Mary Olds** also joined the cruise. Dr. Moore and co-authors recently published some of the research coming from studies of these seamounts in a paper titled "Selected Fauna of Bear Seamount (New England Seamount chain), and the Presence of 'Natural Invader' Species" in the latest issue of *Archive of Fishery and Marine Research*.

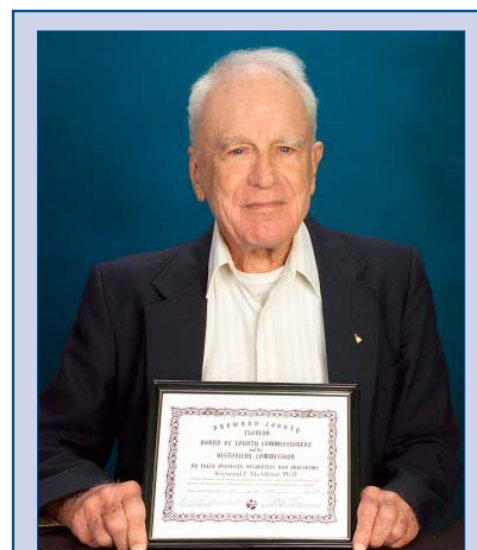
Dr. Jeffrey S. Morton, political science, has had his article titled "Realism Dominance: Updating Vasquez's Power of Power Politics" accepted for publication in the journal *International Studies Review*. The article, which is co-authored with Thomas C. Walker of Albany University, is an empirical examination of the decline of political realism as a guiding theory in international relations research.

Dr. Cyril Parkanyi, chemistry, made two presentations at the 11th International Flavor Conference and 3rd George Charalambous Memorial Symposium held in Pythagorion, Samos, Greece. His presentations were devoted to the computational generation of potential new flavoring structures from thiamine (vitamin B1) and to the analysis of

the volatile constituents of *Tuberose* from southern France. Dr. Parkanyi also visited Paris to continue with the collaboration of the physical properties and dipole moments of biologically important heterocycles with Jean-Jacques Aaron. He made a presentation on the synthesis of thiadiazoles with potential biological activity at a symposium at the 60th southwest regional meeting of the American Chemical Society in Fort Worth. The paper was co-authored with graduate student **Yuxiang Zhao**.

Dr. Nancy K. Poulson, Wilkes Honors College interim dean, chaired a session and presented a paper titled "El transnacionalismo de Isabel Allende en Mi país inventado," at the XXIV Simposio Internacional de Literatura: Afirmación de la Palabra y Rescate de Valores in Buenos Aires, Argentina. Dr. Poulson also facilitated a book presentation, coordinated a round table discussion, and interviewed writers Rima de Vallbona and Maria Rosa Lojo.

Dr. Nancy Romance, science education, was invited by the Smithsonian Institution to serve on a panel to develop a science and literacy initiative for national dissemination. She also was invited by the National Science Teachers Association and the National Science

Dr. Mark H. Rose, history, co-edited the July 2004 issue of the *Journal of Urban History*, which focused on technology, politics and the structuring of the city. The issue also includes an introduction, co-authored with Joel A. Tarr, and Dr. Rose's review essay, "Technology and Politics: The Scholarship of Two Generations of Urban-Environmental Historians." In March 2004, Dr. Rose served as commentator at a session of the Organization of American Historians in Boston titled "Responding to the Urban Crisis: New Perspectives on Postwar Urban Policy." In June, he served as a member of the Kerr Prize Committee (best first paper) in Le Creusot, France, at the annual meeting of the Business History Conference and as chair of a session at the conference titled "Railroads in American and European Business History." In August, Dr. Rose was a member of a History/American Studies review panel for the National Endowment for the Humanities. Penn State University Press published a paper edition of his *Cities of Light and Heat*. In October and November, Dr. Rose served as chair of panels at the meetings of the Urban History Association in Milwaukee, and Traffic, Transport, and Mobility Conference in Dearborn, Mich.

Elizabeth (Betsy) Sias, Coordinator of the Career Resource and Alumni Relations Center in the College of Business, has recently been appointed as Chairperson of the Scholarship Committee for the Southeastern Association of College and Employers (SACE). SACE is composed of career services professional from regional colleges and universities as well as employers who recruit students from those institutions, and services over 600 members in a ten-state area.

Hank Smith, Wilkes Honors College, published four wildlife biology papers in June 2004 with various co-authors. Two of these, "Monetary Valuation of Rare Species and Imperiled Habitats as a Basis for Economically

Evaluating Conservation Approaches" and "Use of Road-kill Data to Index and Relate Raccoon Activity at a Heavily Predated, High-density Marine Turtle Nesting Beach," were published in *Endangered Species Update*. The other two papers, "American Alligator Homing and Site Fidelity" and "Northern Curly-tailed Lizard Predation," were published in *Herpetological Review*.

Dr. Timothy Steigenga, Wilkes Honors College, traveled to Guatemala this summer to give a presentation at FLACSO (Latin American Faculty of Social Sciences) in Guatemala City. The two-week trip also included research and interviews with local authorities in the Guatemalan highland communities of origin of many of South Florida's immigrants. The research trip was part of a larger study funded by the Ford Foundation titled "Latino Immigrants in Florida: Lived Religion, Space, and Power." Dr. Steigenga also procured a \$3,600 grant from the Knight Foundation for Wilkes Honors College students who wish to teach ESL classes in Jupiter, and presented a half-day workshop on "Content-based Learning for High Achievers" for Okeechobee High School teachers.

Dr. Ruth Tappen, Eminent Scholar in Nursing, presented two abstracts at the 2004 Nursing Conference of National Congress on the State of the Science in Nursing Research in Washington D.C.: "Development and Testing of a New Measure of Acculturation and Biculturalism," co-authored with Dr. Christine Williams (University of Miami) and FAU faculty members **Dr. Monica Rosselli** and **Dr. Kathleen Jett**, and "The Effect of an Exercise Routine on Dysphoric Mood of Nursing Home Residents with Alzheimer's Disease," co-authored with Dr. Williams. Dr. Tappen was chosen a National Institutes of Health Reviewer to participate in research ethics study section (expertise in geriatrics, instrument development, cultural sensitivity) to meet in Bethesda, Md. in November.

Dr. Mark Tunick, Wilkes Honors College, had his paper titled "Tolerant Imperialism: J.S. Mill's Defense of British Rule in India" accepted for presentation at the American Political Science Association annual meeting in Chicago. Dr. Tunick's article titled "Can Culture Excuse Crime? Evaluating the Inability Thesis" was published in the October 2004 issue of *Punishment and Society*.

Dr. Jaap Vos, chair, Department of Urban and Public Affairs, and **Dr. Peter Magyar**, director, School of Architecture, secured an exploratory

grant from the South Florida Regional Resource Center, a program of CUES FAU, to develop the Broward Design Collaborative. The BDC will advance knowledge on issues related to urban form in South Florida by creating a forum for urban design-oriented solutions at multiple scales, with the objective to help build healthy communities in Broward County that are walkable, livable and equitable. The leadership team includes DURP assistant professor **Margi Glavovic Nothard**, Knight Fellow and former Fort Lauderdale City Commissioner Gloria Katz and Broward Design Collaborative Director and architecture professor **Glenn Weiss**. The BDC sponsored a three-day workshop on Creative Approaches for Workforce Housing. The workshop was led by FAU Eminent Scholar **Michael Singer**, and made proposals for a five-acre site in the Sistrunk Corridor. This past summer, DURP and architecture students prepared detailed neighborhood plans and specific building designs based on the workshop's principles. The workshop and student work will be published this fall.

Dr. Robert P. Watson, political science, was interviewed by many national and local media outlets throughout the 2004 presidential campaign and on election day, including several live special reports: NBC, ABC, Fox, Associated Press, the *Boston Globe* and the *Chicago Tribune*. Partnering with the League of Women Voters and Palm Beach County Schools, Dr. Watson and a dozen of his students delivered a voting and elections awareness program to area schools that involved developing curricular materials and a website, making presentations in classrooms, training social studies teachers, and conducting a mock presidential election for nearly 38,000 area students in grades 6-12.

Dr. Christian Weisser, Wilkes Honors College, co-edited the book *Electronic Theses and Dissertations*, which was published by Marcel Dekker Press in June 2004. Dr. Weisser also published an article titled "Composition Goes Public: Social Theory and the New Writing Classroom" in the book *Reconciling Public and Private Rhetorics*; edited by Thomas Kent and Barbara Couture and published by Utah State University Press in May 2004.

Dr. Daniel White, Wilkes Honors College, presented a paper titled "The Autopoietic Übermensch: Nietzschean Artistry" at the Second International Conference on New Directions in the Humanities, in Prato, Italy. He presented a second paper, "The Ecosystemic Übermensch: Nietzsche's Human-Ecological Persona," and chaired a session titled "Multiculturalism, Cosmopolitanism, Globalism: Toward a Hybrid Human Identity" at the 9th ISSEI Conference: "The Narrative of Modernity: The Co-Existence of Differences" in Pamplona, Spain.

Coach Green's son, Taurean, who begins his freshman season with the Gators this year. On Nov. 29, FAU plays at Miami as the two teams meet for the 13th consecutive season. Both the Florida and Miami games are scheduled to air live on Sunshine Network.

The Owls home opener features an A-Sun showdown with Gardner-Webb on Dec. 4 followed by Campbell on Dec. 14. A return to non-conference play takes place in Nevada when FAU plays in the Dodge Holiday Classic at the University of Nevada, Dec. 17-18. The Owls round out their non-conference slate at Green's alma mater, UNLV, Dec. 22. The remainder of FAU's 18 games are against A-Sun competition.

"We certainly have one of the most challenging non-conference schedules in the six year's I've been here," said Coach Green. "Both Florida and Nevada are NCAA teams from a year ago while UNLV played in the NIT. However, I think with the core of players we have returning and those we have added, we will be able to have a very successful season."

The Lady Owls begin the regular season with a two-game swing through Tennessee, opening Nov. 19

at Middle Tennessee and concluding at Tennessee Tech. MTSU is the defending Sun Belt Conference champion while Tennessee Tech finished second last year in the Ohio Valley Conference.

The team begins its home schedule with a Thanksgiving tournament Nov. 26-27, featuring James Madison, Morehead State and Youngstown State. The home stand continues with A-Sun games against Lipscomb and Belmont on Dec. 2 and 4, respectively. Its final three non-conference games are road contests with Florida International and Florida State, and a home game against Bethune-Cookman on Dec. 30. FAU's last 18 games are all against A-Sun teams beginning in January.

"I think we have a dynamic non-conference schedule," said Coach Dugan. "Right off the bat, we play an NCAA Tournament team in Middle Tennessee. I believe our fans will really enjoy the tournament we are hosting, and playing three straight teams from Florida is always something to look forward to."
